## Following in giant footsteps with a bag of sweets

As the rector here at St Mary's West Chilt since March 2018, what a privilege it is to have been asked to open this year's very special centenary village show (see page 19 for more about all that's in store this year). Last year I remember the incredibly hot weather, and the optimistic mood, as England were doing so well in the football World Cup. As the showground took the full force of the sun, Rosemary and I managed to try our hand at a 'taster' croquet session, bought several items from stallholders and enjoyed a much-needed drink from the bar. If you haven't had the chance to say hello at any of our services and events, or been to the rectory open garden afternoon, then do stop me and have a chat if you come along to the show. You can take the opportunity to tell me what you think about the 'new look' magazine.

It is so hard to fill the shoes of any previous incumbent, but particularly those of the Rev'd Andrew Caldecott, Rector of St Mary's from 1898 -1928. He was the driving force behind the first West Chiltington Fete and Flower Show in 1919 as a post war celebration of peace and freedom. He also fitted in writing a history of the parish, started the first parish magazine and chaired the meeting at which the first PCC was elected in 1920. This former chaplain to the Marquis of Abergavenny was said to know every inch of the parish and was liked and respected by his parishioners. Having lost his

son, John, in action in 1914, I guess the need to build a peace in a meaningful and very practical way was very near to Rev'd Caldecott's heart.

1919 saw the relaunch of what we now know as *Jelly Babies* (then named *Peace Babies* to mark the signing of the Treaty of Versailles) produced by Bassett's factory in Sheffield. Apparently, the Rev'd Caldecott always had his pockets full of sweets to offer to those who looked like they needed one.

So, at this year's village show I'll by carrying a stash of *Jelly Babies* on me because these sweets have links with my home town of Sheffield, the theme of that first West Chiltington Fete and Flower Show and with Rev'd Caldecott himself. His shoes may be too big to fill but hopefully I can walk in his footsteps with a large bag of sweets... Jelly Baby anyone?

# Working on wellbeing By Nikki Kerr

AT FAMILY Support Work (FSW) we support many families across Sussex, the majority of whom are affected by mental health conditions in some form or another. Many parents are struggling

with anxiety, depression and stress-related conditions, which can have a huge impact on the entire family.

Increasingly we are receiving referrals from schools and health professionals because children are also struggling with these conditions. Children find it much harder to self-regulate and therefore they can be prone to aggressive outbursts when they become overwhelmed. Parenting children with these conditions can become a battlefield, increasing the stress and anxiety of all the family.

Much of the work we do is to support parents to promote their own self-care and in turn help their children feel safe and secure, giving them space to let off steam safely. Our practitioners use many methods to support families where mental health issues are causing concerns.

We regularly receive training in these areas to update our skills and learn new techniques. Recently we have been using the connective parenting technique, which is a hands-on approach to tackling destructive behaviour based on the principles of non-violent resistance. It is based on the notion of parental presence being the cornerstone to building good relationships with children.

#### Paula's story

Paula had fled domestic abuse and arrived in our area with a nine-yearold child. She was scared, sad, depressed and alone when she was referred to us. We were able to engage with her by taking food parcels, games and books for the child and so the relationship started to grow.

She was on high levels of antidepressants and barely able to function - just enough to get her child to school, crawl back to her dismal flat and climb into bed where she would stay all day. Her self-esteem and confidence were at rock bottom, but slowly our practitioner encouraged her to come out and they would meet each week and go somewhere for coffee and a chat.

Paula shared her worries and began to accept advice and support. Gradually she was able to reduce her medication despite enduring several episodes of deep depression and suicidal thoughts, which at times engulfed her, it took a long time.

Our practitioner and Paula worked through these difficult times together and her confidence began to grow to the point where she said: "I am beginning to see a light ahead of me." We helped her to produce a CV and she was able to get a job. She has now been working for over nine months, passed two diplomas and her driving test, is off benefits and has been on holiday.

Her mental health is still fragile, but she is more able to cope. As Paula said: "I'm getting there - it's tough but I will do it." She still has our practitioner in the background to support her and the future for her and her child is looking positive.

# The Fryern Ladies' Probus. Russ Fry reports on Murders and Misdemeanours

**Philip MacDougall**, a local social historian and author, talked to us at our June meeting, about Chichester Murders and Misdemeanours. We were introduced to a young 11-year-old girl — Vera Hoad — who was murdered in February 1924. However, the case has remained unsolved to this day due to the conviction, at the time, that local people were presumed to be innocent. This played a major part in letting a killer go free.

Nothing was quite as it seemed during the Victorian times and public executions (the morning drop) turned out to be an entertaining day out for the family and excellent for local trade. Not quite so excellent for some locals though as murderers, poachers, thieves, pickpockets and vagabonds roamed the streets and all went about their business with impunity and frequenting the tap rooms (pubs) with enthusiasm.

So from other intriguing mentions such as Elephant Prendergast bare knuckle prize fighting, Superintendent Walter Brett, Graylingwell Mental Hospital, Sloe Fair and Ordzhonikidze & Portsmouth – we learned a great deal.

Muriel Astley did the thankyous and said jokingly that she'd found his talk "fascinating but was disappointed that he hadn't told us how to kill someone". His joking reply was to," wait until next time" — the afternoon ended in laughs.

Our next meeting will be held on July 4<sup>th</sup> when we shall hear about Childhood in a Polish Resettlement Camp by Wieslaw Rogalski.


lunch. Sheran is a lady worth listening to and we heard how, as a young bride, she first became a member.

It was very thought-provoking and eye-opening to hear of the difficult conditions that Palestinians are living under in what some consider to be occupied territory.

Interesting lives in the public sector....

An evening of music and conversation for Christian Aid 2019 at St Mary's Church.

St Mary's Church, West Chiltington held a charity social evening back in May to

raise funds for **Christian Aid Week.** The Christian Aid theme this year focussed on the work they are doing in Sierra Leone where childbirth is a dangerous process. Around **£1,260** has been raised for this work by parish co-ordinators **Jim Jarvie and Ali Littleboy** and the team.

A short film showed the massive difference in outcomes that Christian Aid's work has, with so much going to midwives and support services on the ground to improve things for mothers and children and reduce the current very high rate of infant mortality.

We invited along three local church members who have had interesting careers in the public service to talk about their experiences. Throughout the evening we were entertained with live music from our fantastic local folk group, Shipwrecked.

Our first guest was **Dr David Whitehead**, a local GP who explained some of the changes he has seen during his career in the NHS. During his later years he became the Clinical Director for Sussex coastal region. He talked about the responsibility of being part of the team that manages a budget of around £750 million.

Our evening continued with retired Inspector Ian Carlson-Hedges who

spent his career in the Police force in and around South London. Ian talked about how he believed crime could be reduced with more police working closer to a zero-tolerance regime. He highlighted shoplifting where shoplifters need to steal more than £200 to get arrested, so they now steal just under this amount! Ian also talked about some of the scary and humorous moments in his working life.

Our final guest for the evening was **Captain Martin Littleboy**, Royal Navy(Retired). Martin was a seagoing officer who served on a wide range of ships. Royal Navy ships. He saw service in the Icelandic Cod Wars; commanding mine warfare vessels and as operations office on HMS Antrim during the 1982 South Atlantic Conflict. He recounted how the ship was hit by a 1,000-pound Argentinian bomb when landing in San Carlos water. Fortunately, it failed to explode so he lived to tell the tale!

Martin qualified as a Russian interpreter and served in Moscow in the 1980s as Assistant Naval Attaché and then in Kiev as British Defence Attaché and Her Majesty's senior military representative in Ukraine.

Anne Haley a West Chilt resident writes about the impact of 'Merry legs' - assisted riding for children with additional needs

I have been taking my son, who is nine, to 'Merrylegs' at Brinsbury Campus, just outside Pulborough, for a year now. He always smiles when we arrive in the car park as he anticipates the fun and enjoyment he is about to have. Sessions take place on a Monday from 4pm during term time and my little boy rides an adorable Shetland pony called

Hamish. There is another Shetland pony called Merry and two other ponies called Strawberry and Charlie. Two helpers hold my son securely on Hamish and another helper leads the pony. They play games along the way and my son thoroughly enjoys himself. My son is severely physically disabled, but this is no barrier to him enjoying this superb after-school club. The venue at Brinsbury has plenty of parking space for wheelchair-adapted vehicles and being located on the A29 allows for easy access. During the winter, the riding takes place in an indoor school and when the weather turns warmer, the riders and horses venture outside into a sand school or nearby field. There is a picnic in July, so it is a very sociable pastime for the children and parents alike.

The weekly sessions also afford an opportunity for the parents of the small riders to catch up and enjoy a cuppa.



'Merrylegs' is a charity and as such relies on donations as well as the goodwill of the owners and the volunteers who give up their time to help the children enjoy this activity.

I am very grateful that this riding group exists in my local community and long may it continue!

# friends

On a day of beautiful, blue skies, twenty-six Storrington Probus Club members and partners enjoyed a splendid Blue Badge guided tour organised by Cliff Palmer.

The group first explored the gem that is Savill Garden, which is part of the Windsor Great Park. There were acres of marvellous grounds planted sensitively with many different areas of seemingly endless flowers. Some were displayed in traditional flower beds whilst others were discovered in intriguing hidden areas with many different trees, and bushes. Our tour included a lovely walk through scented azaleas, camellias and rhododendrons as well as a Chelsea rose show garden from a previous winner at the Chelsea Flower Show. We saw the fountain in the Golden Jubilee Garden which has an engraving made by our "mason" Cliff Palmer. # D-DAY REMEMBERANCE WALKS AT COOLHAM ALG AIRFIELD.

# Bob Lomas summarises what walkers enjoyed on 9<sup>th</sup> June...

The walk around the Airfield was about two miles, half of it on well cut grass, but being an airfield, it is an open vista so with excellent views. The Selsey Arms strongly supports the Airfield and has on show many items of memorabilia, where one can relax in the unspoilt old world charm and imagine the war time atmosphere, packed with pilots and ground crews, soldiers, so many different accents, farm workers and land girls. All in a thick cloud of tobacco smoke, a cacophony of sound with occasional bursts of song except when the news or Mr Churchill was on the wireless, when all fell silent.

In 1944 as the allied forces prepared for the greatest armada and coastal invasion in history, two most important factors became clear. essentially, they had to have complete air superiority and sufficient landing grounds to accommodate their operations. What was needed were temporary airfields but nevertheless sufficiently robust to accommodate fighter aircraft. An airfield design was drawn up and locations selected for nine airfields close to the English Channel to be known as ALGs Advanced Landing Grounds. Finding the locations could not have been easy as airfields for war planes take a lot of space. the area has to be reasonably level and away from dense habitation. Most areas of that nature were of farmland and at that time food production was a top priority. Nevertheless, nine sites were found and work began on the first, at Bognor Regis in December 1942. 1943 saw an all-out action to construct a further seven ALGs including Coolham, Chailey, Apuldram, Cowdray Park, Deanland, Funtingdon, Hammerwood, another was planned for Pulborough but was not started.

Today one can easily drive past these historic sites that were a vital part of that critical episode in our nation's history and not even notice them. Back in 1944 it would have been very different: the roar of Rolls Royse Merlin engines in the Spitfires and Mustangs flying low overhead could be deafening.

At this our memorial airfield in the quiet rural parish of Shipley in West Sussex, exceedingly brave young fighter pilots, British, Canadian, New Zealand and Polish, took to the skies day after day to ensure our continued freedom from oppression and to liberate Europe.

They knew only too well that every day they flew towards the English Channel it might well be their last and for too many of them it was. As we walked around the airfield, now so peaceful with its lush green pastures and thick hedgerow homes to countless small birds bordering healthy growing crops, we considered those young men in their prime with everything to lose, putting all at stake towards that terrible and horrific price of freedom for generations to come. Think of the intensity of those all too emotional times, so emotional and intense in fact that one might even hear a voice or sound still lingering in the atmosphere from those now far off days and nights of bitter conflict, a reminder that the price of freedom is constant and ongoing and we ignore it at our peril.
