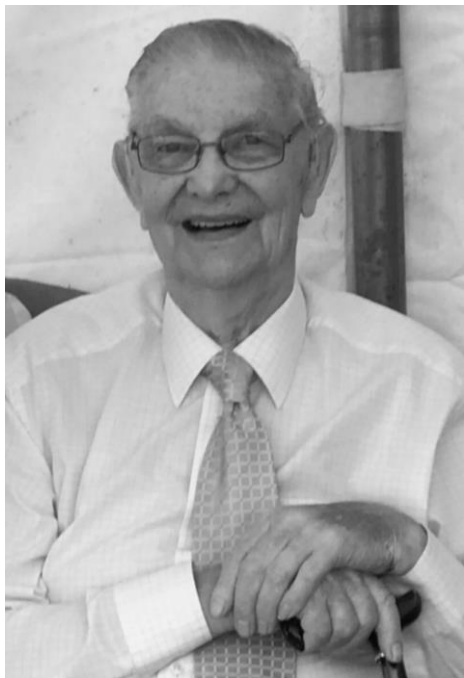

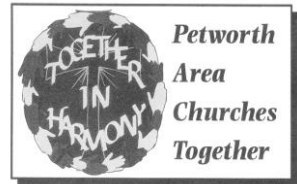

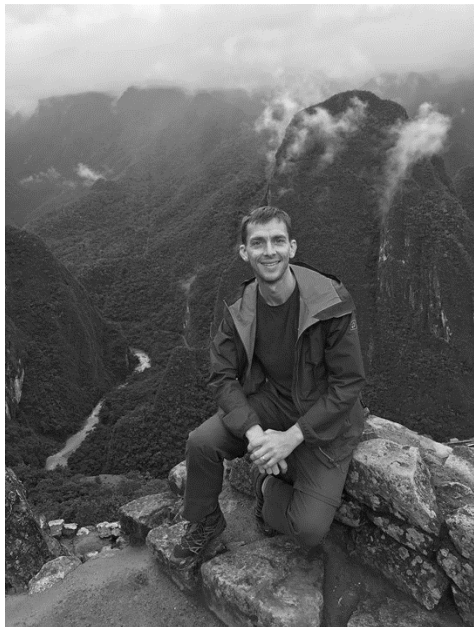

Nick, a family man recently sold his business and was looking to contribute to the local community. He chose The Chestnut Tree House, a fine local organisation offering support for terminally ill children and their families. Nick joined their trip to Peru and with 30 others undertook the Inca Trail to Machu Picchu. The talk was not a just series of family snaps but a very moving personal account of his journey and that of his fellow travellers who were bound together by a common purpose.

The physical aspects of the trek were tough, altitude sickness was a key issue, Nick along with many others suffered a headache for the whole trip. The highest point on the trek was some 4,200 metres. Alongside many wonderful photographs Nick interwove the story of personal endeavour, shared experience, team work and the dedication and friendliness of the guides & porters (wikies). It was reassuring to hear that guides and porters are valued members of the community and their health, welfare and financial well-being are constantly reviewed. Each member of the team had personal reasons for the trip and were able to raise money for a very good cause. In total, the team raised £150,000 which is enough to support the charity's work for 16 days. # **West Chiltington Horticultural Society**

## **for people who enjoy gardens and gardening**



Paul Patton was our speaker at the March meeting and, if we have not seen enough water over the last few months, he was encouraging us to make a pond in our gardens. His own preference is for a wildlife pond which he felt is an essential element in maintaining the ecological balance in the garden. As well as providing a home for frogs, newts and many insects, the water would be welcomed by birds and mammals, including hedgehogs if you were very lucky.

Paul took us through the steps in making a pond. At the outset it is important to ensure that the pond is in a fairly open position so that it does not become a depository for leaves in the autumn. Try to make it an interesting shape and have sections which are of different depths. This will allow you to include a wider range of plants although Paul cautioned us not to include too many plants as no more than 50% of the pond area should be covered to allow light to get to the water. For a small garden pond it was important to seek out some of the less vigorous varieties of our favourite plants, otherwise we would find ourselves burdened with a major maintenance job every year in an effort to keep them in check.

When constructing the pond it is important to ensure that one section has a slope into the water to allow easy access for birds and mammals coming for a drink as well as an exit route for those unfortunate enough to fall in. He also encouraged us to include a small fountain as this would not only allow oxygen to be added to the water but provide a restful background ambience. However, on hot days this water feature can add to water loss and Paul told us that when topping up we should add no more than 10% of the total volume of the pond each day.

But it is not all fun and, as with all garden features, some routine maintenance is to be expected. The surface should be kept clear of excess floating weed so that light can enter the pond. If algae strikes then it can be difficult to remove so prevention is the best cure. Chemicals are available but a small block of barley straw will do the job as well. From time to time it may be necessary to clean the bottom of the pond as sludge will build up which can have an adverse effect on the pH pond water. This should be removed but as this is the spot where

many insect larvae live the removed matter should be left next to the pond to allow the creatures to find their way home.



This was the first meeting of the year where members were able to submit specimens for the competition table and it was a reminder that spring was here with some delightful daffodils and spring flowers.

Attendance at our March meeting was, unfortunately, very much down as coronavirus seems to be a discouragement to going out. Our next meeting on 8 April is due to be a talk by Chris Stewart called “Earthworms- everything you wanted to know but were afraid to ask.”

After arranging our 100th Birthday Celebration for February 2021 – having only just celebrated our 99th last month – the ladies listened to other brief issues of business (especially the never ending menace of potholes in our area) before

settling down attentively for the Speaker (and yes we do like to celebrate at WCWI).

Our Speaker, Stephen Morphew's talk title was "Japan as a Tourist" and, since some of us had already been to that country, it was nice to



recollect our memories of such a beautiful place and people. We were told that even today relatively few "gaijin" (foreigners) visit Japan from Europe and he hoped that his talk would inspire more to make the journey! Maybe we should suggest founding a Japanese WI?

Stephen, being a professional tutor with more than 35 years of public presentations, now lives in Japan (and has indeed married a

beautiful Japanese wife) so definitely needs to know the protocol and how to behave. Some behavioural customs and manners were passed on to us and here are a few:

Japan is a cash society, a lot of shops do not even accept credit cards, moreover many Japanese ATMS do not accept foreign debit and credit cards so cash is the norm especially the 1,000 yen note!

Japan has one of the world's lowest crime rates.



Japan is known worldwide for its traditional arts, including tea ceremonies, calligraphy and flower arranging. Japanese culture – art, religion, samurai, geisha, shiro (castle) etc. are all part of the story and tradition is respected and honoured.

don't wear shoes in the house. Most homes have a small vestibule called a "genkan" where shoes should be removed and slippers put on.

don't give a tip in Japan as tipping is not a standard practice and in fact will be perceived as an insult. Service workers like waiters, taxi drivers and hairstylists receive a reasonable wage and do not expect any bonus payment from their customers.

Japan is crazy about vending machines which offer customers a multitude of convenient buys of just about anything – even raw eggs!

## Tackling child poverty

Former teacher Fiona Mackay has been commissioned as the Children's Society diocesan ambassador. She had been a speaker ambassador since retiring from her career in 2016 and last year was asked to develop her role into diocesan ambassador.



The Church of England-based Children's Society aims to fight child poverty, tackle neglect and support victims through working with local authorities, dioceses around the country and planting 100 plus hubs in major cities. Hubs are where children are able access a hot meal, costing the Children's Society £4 per child. Funds not only come from individual fundraising but Society charity shops. In the Diocese of Chichester they can be found in Brighton, Shoreham, Horsham and Chichester.

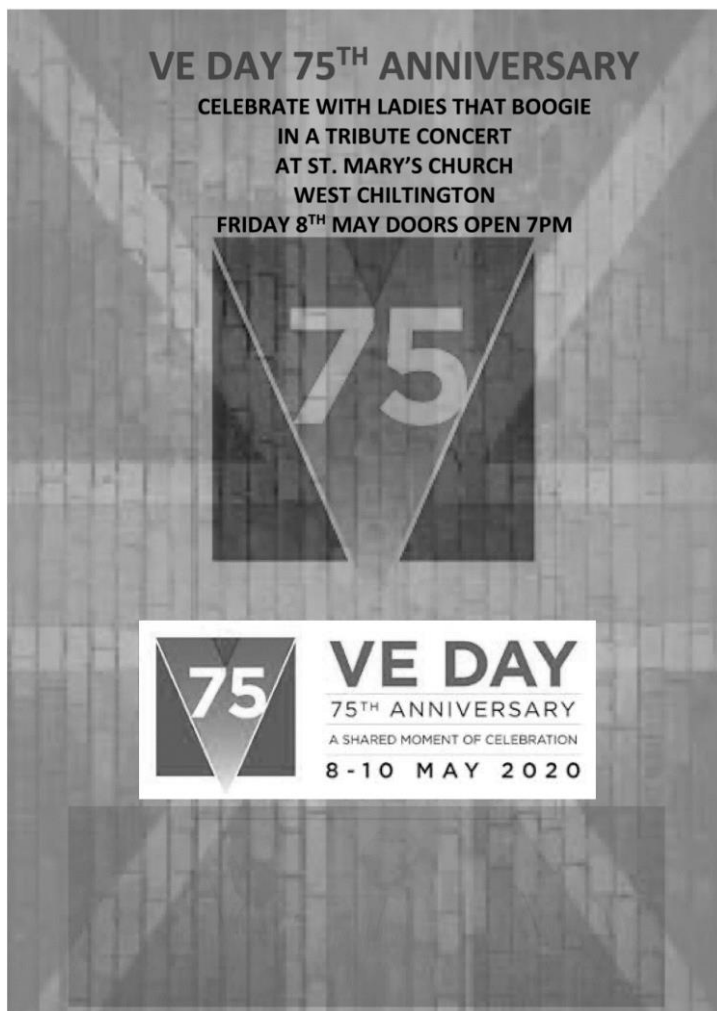
Fiona, who was commissioned by Bishop Martin Warner at the Diocesan Synod, said: "The happiness of children is of fundamental importance. If they're not happy then they can't succeed and they can't concentrate in school, they don't see the point in education. "I believe that education is the absolute key thing for not just happiness but for future development."

Fiona is touring the diocese raising awareness of the charity. She said: "Prayer is the strongest weapon of all." Some four million children are in poverty in the UK alone, with predictions of that number increasing in

2020. Fiona said: "Many children, even in this beautiful county of Sussex, live in poverty, and that is why I have chosen to do this."

As part of the preparation of the West Chiltington Neighbourhood Plan, we need to identify site allocations for development in order to address local needs. We are calling out to landowners in the Parish of West Chiltington who may have an interest in promoting their land for development. The Neighbourhood Plan is looking to address our needs over the next 15 years.

If you are a landowner – or represent a landowner - and wish for your land to be considered for allocation in the Neighbourhood Plan, you are required to provide us with details using the ‘Site Submission’ form available from West Chiltington Parish Council. Email [clerk@wcpc.org.uk](mailto:clerk@wcpc.org.uk) or phone 01798 817434.

The form should be used to suggest new potential development sites to West Chiltington Parish Council or to provide updates to sites which have already been submitted to the Council. Please fill in a separate form for each site you wish to be considered.

Completed forms must be received by West Chiltington Parish Council by 5pm Friday 24 April 2020.

DO submit sites that:

- Are likely to become available for development or redevelopment within the next 1-5, 6-10 or 11+ years
- Could accommodate 5 or more dwellings (for housing proposals)
- Is above 0.25ha or 500m<sup>2</sup> floorspace (for economic development proposals)
- Are accompanied by a clear site map (ideally 1:1250 scale on an OS map base) clearly showing the site boundary. We will not accept sites unless a map is provided.
